From Clinic to Community: Empowering Health Through the Live Well Center

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BACKGROUND AND IMPORTANCE IN MEDICAL EDUCATION

ACGME: Residents must promote health, communicate effectively, and serve as teachers.

CLER 2021: Only 30% of residents received population-specific cultural competency training.

Englewood Health's Community Medicine curriculum emphasized equitable care but lacked outreach.

The "Talk with a Doc" series at the Shirvan Family Live Well Center bridges this gap.

DESIGN

Engagement outside exam room


12 community talks done so far

16 residents participated

Key health themes based on Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) data

Ambulatory Chief Resident: pivotal role in liaising between the LWC and residents, coordinates speakers, and ensures sustainability

Talk provided in plain language, teaching materials provided in Spanish and English



INTENDED OUTCOME

Providing resident hands-on experience in community medicine

Empowering community members to make informed health decision

Future goal: To increase engagement by incorporating topics of interest and encouraging more resident participation

TRANSFERABILITY

While not all institutions have a dedicated community health center, this model can be adapted by partnering with local organizations, offering residents valuable opportunities to engage with the communities they serve and fostering stronger connections between providers and patients.
